

Greg Caramenico is an attorney in private practice who occasionally writes about the history of ideas, legal philosophy, and Italian Jews.

Greg's research interests include Italian intellectual and economic history from antiquity to the Enlightenment. He holds a JD from the Benjamin N. Cardozo School of Law, and an MA (history) from Vanderbilt University. He conducted research at archives across northern and central Italy, at Harvard University's Villa I-Tatti Center in Florence, Italy, and at Vanderbilt Law School. Greg's research at Vanderbilt Law School on legal and ethical aspects of cognitive neuroscience led to the co-authored book (with Lenn Goodman of Vanderbilt's Philosophy Department) *Coming to Mind* (University of Chicago Press, 2014). Greg was an early commentator on neuroscientific approaches to legal doctrine and a researcher in areas of "neurolaw" and evolutionary analysis of law.

He is currently a senior executive editor of the *Italian Law Review*.

Greg is fluent in Italian. A longtime student of Persian language, literature, and Iranian history, he is proficient in Persian, and speaks and reads Hebrew. He also reads French and Ladino.

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
